School Parent and Family Engagement Policy

PART I.

The **Bill Childress Elementary** agrees to implement the following statutory requirements:

- 1. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will take the following actions to involve parents in the joint development of its school parent and family engagement plan under ESSA section 1116:

- 3. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will hold an annual meeting to inform parents of the school's participation in Title I, Part A programs, and to explain the Title I, Part A requirements and the right of parents to be involved in Title I, Part A programs. The school will convene the meeting at a time convenient for parents and will offer a flexible number of additional parental involvement meetings, such as in the morning or evening, so that as many parents as possible are able to attend. The school will invite all parents of children participating in Title I, Part A programs to this meeting, and will encourage them to attend, by:
 - Sending notices and invitations home in English and Spanish
 - School Messenger reminders in English and Spanish
 - Personal phone calls by our Parent Liaison

The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will provide parents of participating children information in a timely manner about Title I, Part A programs that includes a description and explanation of the school's curriculum, the forms of academic assessment used to measure children's progress, and the proficiency levels students are expected to meet by:
 - Sending progress reports home every 3 weeks and sharing I-Station data, and unit assessment data with parents
 - Interpreting school documents in a parent's primary language
 - Having an interpreter on hand to translate important information at school wide meetings and events
 - Working with a sign language interpreter to provide translation during parent/teacher conferences,

- Working with an interpreter to provide translation during parent/teacher conferences, making available parent resource in our center that are in English and Spanish
- Inviting parents to the ARD, 504, and SST meetings
- Having parent representation at LPAC meetings as required by law
- 5. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will, at the request of parents, provide opportunities for regular meetings for parents to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of their children. The school will respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible by:
 - Using the School Messenger in English and Spanish
 - Setting up conferences with teacher
 - Setting up conferences with administration
 - *Personal phone call by the administration*
 - *Personal phone call by teacher*
 - Personal phone call by the Parent Liaison
- 6. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will provide parents with guidance on how to access TEA Family Portal to view State Test Results (e.g., STAAR, STAAR Alt., TELPAS, TELPAS Alt.). Computers will be available in the parent center for parents to access and print reports.
- 7. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will take the following actions to provide each parent timely notice when their child has been assigned or has been taught for four (4) or more consecutive weeks by a teacher who is not highly qualified within the meaning of the term in section 200.56 of the Title I Final Regulations (67 Fed. Reg. 71710, December 2, 2002) by mail or notice sent home with the student.
- **8.** The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will provide assistance to parents of children served by the school, as appropriate, in understanding topics by undertaking the actions described in this paragraph --
 - the state's academic content standards,
 - the state's student academic achievement standards.
 - Texas Attendance Law
 - the state and local academic assessments including alternate assessments,
 - *the requirements of Part A,*
 - how to monitor their child's progress, and
 - how to work with educator

- 9. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will provide materials and training to help parents work with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement, by:
 - Parent Teacher Conferences
 - *Literacy Night(s)*
 - Opening the Parent Center to the parents and parent volunteers and have computers, printers, and other equipment available for parents to use
 - Parent University sessions
- 10. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will, with the assistance of its parents, educate its teachers, pupil services personnel, principals and other staff in how to reach out to, communicate with, and work with parents as equal partners in the value and utility of contributions of parents, and in how to implement and coordinate parent programs and build ties between parents and schools, by offering the opportunity to parents and community members to become volunteers at our school.
- 11. The <u>Bill Childress Elementary School</u> will, to the extent feasible and appropriate, coordinate and integrate parental involvement programs and activities with Head Start, Reading First, Early Reading First, Even Start, Home Instruction Programs for Preschool Youngsters, the Parents as Teachers Program, public preschool, or other programs.
